



May Malvika serve as a lasting testament to the talent and passion that defines our University, and may it inspire all the Malaviyans who encounter it to embrace their creative potential.







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
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
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
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From the TY TY Vice-Chancellor's

I am also delighted to announce that the Uni-

versity has made a historical achievement by securing commendable ranks in three categories of NIRF Rankings 2024 released by the Ministry of Education, Government of India. It stood 84th in India in the Engineering category, 94th in India in the University category, and 40th in India in the State Public Universities category. This result reflects the collective hard work our University community. Our success is due to the persistent inspiration and guidance of Hon'ble Chancellor Smt. Anandiben Patel ji and the effective leadership of Hon'ble Chief Minister of UP Shri Yogi Aditynath ji, for which we are profoundly grateful.

Last one year has been filled with numerous achievements and activities. More than 90% of the eligible students got placed in reputed companies including Amazon, TCS, Wipro, HCL, Infosys, Flipkart and other leading companies with Rs. 42 LPA being the highest annual package offered by Amazon. The University signed 6 National MoUs and an International MoU for academic collaboration. Electronics & Communication Engineering Department received funding of Rs. 1.12 Crores from MeitY, Govt. of India under the Visvesvaraya PhD Scheme to conduct research on Drones and Semiconductors. The Department of Electrical Engineering also received funding of Rs. 19.5 Lakhs from the Uttar Pradesh Council for Science & Technology, Lucknow to develop a Solar Powered Electric Boat. MMMUT also became the 1st State University in Uttar Pradesh to completely switch to online governance and to fully adopt the Samarth E-Governance Portal developed by the University of Delhi with support from the Ministry of Education, Govt. of India. Hon'ble Chancellor/ Governor of Uttar Pradesh Smt. Anandiben Patel ji inaugurated MMMUT's Samarth Portal. To focus on skill development and to make students industry-ready, 17 Professors of Practice and Adjunct Faculty have been appointed in various departments of the University.

The University is committed to facilitating ample opportunities for students, to develop holistically and nurture their creativity. The students' magazine is a splendid avenue to illustrate the latent literary talents and creativity of the students. It is a document of the collective wisdom of the students. I am sure; Malvika would be an apt milestone on our path towards our mission of knowledge and service.

To fulfil University's social obligations and to promote the culture of social service among the students, Center for Extension and Field Outreach has been established to coordinate such activities. Moreover, the University has approved guidelines for pursuing two academic degrees simultaneously. This innovative approach not only broadens the academic horizons for students but also encourages interdisciplinary learning, allowing students to gain diverse skills and knowledge that can be beneficial in an increasingly competitive job market.

To ensure high-speed network access to everyone on the campus, Network Upgradation and Extension work was completed at the cost amounting to Rs. 5.28 Crores. These technologically advanced classrooms are designed to facilitate interactive learning experiences, enabling faculty to employ innovative teaching methods that engage students more effectively. 
To The Reader

The university fraternity was elated with zeal and enthusiasm to rejoice in the new chapter of life that awaited its passing out students, celebrating their hard work and achievements. The eighth convocation was presided over by the Hon'ble Chancellor and Governor of Uttar Pradesh, Smt. Anandiben Patel, a figure of inspiration and leadership, who emphasized the importance of education in shaping the future of the nation. The chief guest was Shri Rajesh Rai, Chairman and Managing Director of ITI Limited, Bangalore, who is not only an esteemed professional but also a proud alumnus of the year 1992 (Electronics and Communication Engineering) of the university. His presence served as a testament to the university's enduring legacy and the success of its graduates. Additionally, the Minister of Technical Education, Government of Uttar Pradesh, Shri Ashish Patel, graced the ceremony with his presence as the special guest, further highlighting the significance of this the culmination of years of effort, dedication, and event in the region's educational landscape. He stated about the numerous accolades and achievements of the university and highlighted that, indeed it was a great achievement for the university to receive a well-deserved A grade in the NAAC evaluation. He said that the establishment of Internet of Things as a specialisation branch under the aegis of Electronics and Communication Engineering Department, itself speaks a lot about the mission of this university. eighth convocation ceremony officially commenced with a formal announcement made by the Hon'ble Chancellor, marking the beginning of this significant academic celebration. Following this, she took a moment to administer the convocation oath, a ceremonial pledge that the graduating students recited with pride and commitment. This moment was particularly special as it represented



Abhay Narayan Sapru is a distinguished author and a decorated Special Forces officer, renowned for his authentic and gripping storytelling. His works, such as The Beckoning Isle and In The Valley of Shadows, offer a vivid portrayal of conflict, focusing on the Indian Peace Keeping Force's operations in Sri Lanka and counterinsurgency efforts in Kashmir. His experience on the ground as a combat soldier lends a rare authenticity to his narratives. The Editorial Board is honored to present an interview with him.

Q) What was your motivation behind joining the Indian Army?

I had a great advantage because my father also came from the army, and when you're growing up reading commando comics with a father who is serving in the army it is motivational enough. Later on, we settled down in Dehradun, where the Indian Military Academy is, and I saw a whole bunch of cadets when I went out to the market. I also had a few friends in the academy. So at some stage, when I was in college, it occurred to me that if I didn't join I would regret it, I could be a manager, a salesman at thirty-thirty-five but could never be an Army officer, could never serve in the armed forces if I didn't do it straight after college. So, much against my mother's wishes, I went ahead and joined the army.

Q) What changes did you feel in your regular life when you stepped into the academy?

It's a different life altogether. They have a bunch of people coming from all walks of life, used to leading a life where they get up whatever time they feel like but now they have to break those habits to ground zero and train the boy to become a man so that he fits into an organization where he is sharpened, trained, and motivated to be a leader of men in combat. So it's a life-changing experience and a very different life altogether.

Q) What led you to volunteer for the Special Forces? What was the toughest part of your probation?

There are two parts to this, for the first part of the question, when I was in my third term, i.e., the final term of the academy, I had this special forces havaldar, an instructor who was posted to the academy, and he had come back straight from Sri Lanka where they were involved in Sri Lankan conflict, where he had seen combat. There he was posted as our weapons instructor and he was a tall, slim, good-looking Himachali as I still recall, he survived Sri Lanka he subsequently died in the North East, his name was Rigendra and I liked his style, and unlike the other instructors who would bray, rant, shout, scream and punish you if you made a mistake, this guy would only smile at you and with a twinkle in his eyes challenge you to do your best, and in between breaks I would chat with him about his experiences and what I understood from what he was telling me was that this was very unorthodox soldiery, people could keep long hair and long beards and operate independently and I liked the sound of it. I didn't want to get into the spit and polish of regular infantry of the regular army, I wished to soldier differently and what he told me made a lot of sense, hence I decided to volunteer for it.

As far as the probation is concerned that is a completely different ball game. It's ninety days of hell that a special force unit puts you through, it's a psychological and a mental test and they work on an adage that they firmly believe in that it is not possible to know how much is enough unless you've experienced how much is more than enough, so following that to a T they push you to the limits and beyond to see where you'll crack, they want to see that chink in the armor, and the rejection rates could be as high as eighty percent. They believe in quality rather than the quantity it's not all about physical fitness all the time because they believe that they can improve your physical fitness once you're in the unit but they're looking at the attitude, well they are looking at a whole bunch of qualities but one of them is your attitude because they firmly believe that if you don't have the attitude, you're not going to fit so you've to understand that in a 1.3 million volunteer army which has its basic selection procedure, you then have to revolunteer if you're under the age of twenty-six in any part of the army then they put you through this ninety days of hell and after that they train you. They train you till it becomes muscle memory, so by the end, you have this body of men who are trained to perfection, motivated with other qualities necessary to be able to operate behind enemy lines for example, independently without looking over their shoulders to get orders all the time and are task-oriented, focused that they need to finish it. So yes probation is tough and everybody doesn't get through. You have to be 100% committed to making it through and most people don't.

Q) What goes on in the mind of an officer leading his men before, during, and after the contact?

Nobody knows if contact is going to happen, in a counterinsurgency environment which is where the special forces and the bulk of the army have been employed, i.e. in Kashmir, in the North East, in Sri Lanka, these are all terrains and conflicts which are guerrilla warfare specific, so it is not a conventional war, it's not like Kargil where you know that there is an enemy post and you need to attack it, so when you're leading the whole objective is to maintain the surprise, all movement is done at night. The idea is that you move from point A to point B which could be your target area, could be an ambush operation, could be a search operation, it could be a raid, the idea is to maintain the surprise, the special forces work on the old principles of guerrilla warfare, which is speed, surprise, uncertainty, and violence so when you're leading, the question as a leader is in your mind is to ensure that surprise is maintained. When you're in contact, the objective is to ensure that you dominate the opposition in a firefight, if you have a casualty ensure that the casualty is pulled back and you manage to get the injured back for medical treatment. It's not like a sales team in civil life where your performance is measured by how much you've sold, what you've built, maybe if you're an engineer. Here you talk in life, so if you have no casualty and you manage to get a few from the other side it is a great operation. You come back and you celebrate. But if you do have a casualty, you have a problem, nobody likes that, so you have to have different mindsets for different operations, that is how it is.

And let me tell you something, the circumstances dictate leadership styles, I do a few talks on leadership and management sometimes. You can't have one single approach to leadership. Tomorrow you're going to be in those positions as managers, seniors managers, or as part of the team, it is imperative that at that stage you decide if you want to be autocratic in your leadership, you want to be democratic in your leadership or you want to be friendly, the nature of the task will decide and you must as a leader, as a manager have the adaptability to switch your style.

Q) During your tenure in the Special Forces, you served in Sri Lanka. Do you support the thought that the Indian Special Forces must also be sent to foreign missions like the US Navy Seals?


As a Military soldier, you are built to operate based on your capability, and training, and your equipment are designed to keep your political ambitions. We as an army cannot be deployed globally comparatively as American Seals, our focus is in and around the subcontinent, and therefore we have trained accordingly. Moreover, the major problem will be held regarding the wherewithal, so we do not see that happening. Nevertheless, we had Indian troops carry out a special force operation in Sierra Leone and other special force operations such as Khukri. There is a saying that goes, if a thing is worth doing, it is worth doing well. It's a state of mind, students who are pursuing engineering, it's what they're designed for, you've to put in the 100% to climb the ladder and get success so it's a question of what you are designed, made, and built for.

Q) What difference do you see in the arsenal of the Special Forces during your time and the present day?

Not to mention, my soldiering is twenty years plus. I have briefly mentioned in my third book, that the opposition, the mujahideen, was interestingly similar, carried the same weaponry, and the same radio sets, solely different from the only advantage we had. We could throw more troops and our casualties could be treated in a medical hospital if pulled out in time. Initially, we were not using big guns, gunships, or artillery, comparatively now you have drones and other big ammunition, and any movement or sound can be picked out at the line of control or fence, etc. like you see in the movies, it starts tracking the movement of the militants. Intelligence is mighty and brawny today.

Q) Low visibility, high performance. This is what describes the working of the Special Forces. Do you think there the army should publicize the stories of valor and courage to let the general public know about such great heroes?

Primarily valor should be written, talked about, and should be introduced in schools. Coming to the special forces, my belief, and I am sure a lot of people who come from the special forces community will tell you that we are supposed to operate in the shadows, we are not supposed to be ideally talking about our operations nevertheless for some reasons of you know heightened nationalism in today's India, there's been a lot of noise about surgical strikes, a documentary has been made and so much talk about special force operations, etc. but rightly if you ask me they shouldn't be talked about, not the special force operations, you go in you hit you fade into the shadows. But it's a different world now everything gets reported, mobiles are on, and the internet is running so we have to live with it but certainly, valor should be talked about and it should never be forgotten.

Q) Sir, you have achieved various accomplishments in your name and college. Could you kindly describe yourself and your experiences during academics?

I began my academic journey at Sikkim Manipal Institute of Technology as a first-year engineering student and subsequently transitioned to the mechanical engineering branch. I graduated in 2016 with a CGPA of 9.57, earning a bronze medal from the university. Following my graduation, I took a sabbatical to prepare for prestigious exams such as GATE and ISRO. In 2017, I successfully qualified for the position of Scientific Officer at the Bhabha Atomic Research Center (BARC). However, my ambition led me to persist in my endeavors for ISRO, where I secured an All India Rank of 4 in 2018 and accepted a position as a scientist after resigning from my role at the Department of Atomic Energy.

role at the Department of Atomic Energy.
In January 2020, I chose to resign from ISRO to pursue my entrepreneurial aspirations, launching a podcast and focusing on writing a book and developing a personality development course. My first book, "The Boy Who Did Not Sign," was published on

August 15, 2023.

Q) How can we address the challenges of handling failure during adolescence while also promoting bettermental health practices? One observation I have about teenagers and young adults in their early twenties is that they often fail to grasp the true magnitude of failure. Failure is not vastly different from success; both are integral parts of life. We tend to experience failure far more frequently than success, and the reality is that in the pursuit of any goal, failure is inevitable and will occur at least ten times more often than success. I believe people need to shift their mindset about failure. It is a powerful teacher, imparting valuable lessons that success cannot. In fact, not experiencing failure is a more significant issue, as it likely indicates a lack of effort or ambition. The difference between my current self and my younger self is that now I understand rejection as an inherent part of the journey. When faced with setbacks, I quickly rise, focusing on learning and progressing. Personal growth and self-improvement are integral components of this process. Young people, as they embark on their independent journeys, will discover that most things in life don't unfold as anticipated, unlike earlier times when they had fewer worries. They must become adept problem solvers, embracing the necessity of being comfortable with discomfort.

Q) Sir, as the selection rate of IIT-JEE is fairly low, so most of the aspirants end up taking admissions in other tier-3 colleges. So could you share the mindset adjustments you made prior to your undergraduate studies that allowed you to maintain a disciplined pproach and to transition out of your comfort zone when necessary Well, I never aspired to get into IIT-JEE, as I wasn't an exceptional student. Throughout my school life, I was an average student with 50% grades, which made me realize that getting into IIT was unlikely. When I entered college, I underwent a transformative epiphany. I realized that my current circumstances were a direct result of my past actions, and this understanding empowered me to take control of my future. I grasped the concept that my present choices would shape my tomorrow. This revelation sparked a determination in me to change and improve myself, starting from that moment when I was 18. I embraced the idea that my future is not predetermined but is, in fact, a canvas waiting to be painted by my actions. Reflecting on the past 5 years of guiding students, I've been repeatedly confronted with the question, 'I feel guilty for not getting into a top-tier University, while it was never a personal goal of mine, I recognize that many others strive for it. I addressed this topic in a 2019 Delhi seminar and a YouTube video titled 'Message to Non-IITians.' My point is that getting into IIT doesn't guarantee success, and conversely, not getting in doesn't means failure. While I could cite examples of successful individuals who didn't attend IIT or dropped out, the core idea remains the same, "success is not solely determined by institutional credentials". Working on self-improvement leads to growth and value creation. I experienced this transformation firsthand. Until age 18, I was a poor performer, ranking at the bottom with 50-60% scores. However, in college, I dedicated myself to studying and became a topper. In my book, I share a story about my time in BARC training school, where I simultaneously prepared for ISRO. The contrast is striking, I achieved AIR-4 in ISRO but was at the bottom of the list in BARC. This shows that focus and attention matters. Despite being the same person, working at two different things at the same time, the outcome was vastly different. It's not your past that defines your future, but the effort you put in.

Q) Sir, what insight can you provide on the benefit of pursuing activities like martial art or hobbies along side academics commitments considering your own experience as a black belt in Karate when the same time can be invested in strengthening the academic subjects. Regardless of your schedule, everyone has at least one hour to spare each day for a side activity. I've made time for it throughout my journey – as a university topper, while preparing for competitive exams, and even as a working scientist. I'd invest an hour each morning in personal development, which may seem insignificant but can lead to substantial growth.

My go-to activity was martial arts, and I'd recommend exploring YouTube for resources. You can find plenty of tutorials, tips, and advice from experts, even UFC champions. Consistency is key, so allocate time each day to learn something new. Follow your interests, whether it's martial arts or other hobbies, and utilize online resources like YouTube channels and websites to aid your

ourney.

Q) Sir, as a student you have had valuable internship experiences at Steel Authority of India and Tata pvt ltd, so what guidance would you offer to students seeking good internship opportunity that can enhance skills and boost their resumes.

Internships are crucial, and I started pursuing them after my second semester. I landed my first internship in June 2013, right after my second semester, which gave me industry exposure and motivated me to build a career in machines. Networking is key, maintain a good relationship with your seniors, as they can help you secure internships. I did 5 internships in 4 years, including a four-month stint, which helped me understand engineering and boosted my confidence in job interviews. Having a good GPA can also lead to internships at prestigious institutions like IITs, especially if you're interested in research. Remember, internships are essential for learning and growth, so grab as many opportunities as possible.

Q) Nowadays, there is a trend where a lot of students are gravitating towards CSE and IT branches resulting in saturation and restrainments in the IT sector. Do you believe this is due to wailing interest in core field or a lack of clear career direction among graduates

graduates. The root cause of the issue is a lack of genuine interest in engineering. Many students opt for the quickest route to a job, often driven by market demands rather than passion. In 2012, everyone was drawn to IT, but I chose mechanical engineering due to my clear interest. However, 90% of students lack interest in their chosen field. I believe this is a problem. Even in other fields like arts, commerce, media, or design, career options are limited. India needs more engineers to drive its industrial revolution, which was hampered by colonization and delayed due to Soviet influence. While IT is booming now, core sectors will see growth as new industries emerge. We need to focus on building a strong foundation in engineering to catch up with developed countries.

Q) In light of the fact that for securing a good role demand is more than just passing a written exam and inverse a charismatic personality during the interviews. What would you consider the top priority for an engineering student who needs technical skill and knowledge or enhancing soft skills and networking abilities.

knowledge or enhancing soft skills and networking abilities. Well, I didn't network during my undergraduate days, which was a mistake. However, I did leverage my seniors for internship opportunities to prepare for GATE examinations. Networking and communication are essential but on the same hand we shouldn't overshadow our technical abilities. As an engineer, having strong technical skills is crucial, but without communication and interpersonal skills, you won't progress. To improve my communication skills, I started speaking in front of a mirror, recording myself, and identifying areas for improvement. I consistently practiced this for six years before creating YouTube videos in English. This helped me develop hyperconfidence, which is vital in interviews. So, its not what you know, it is more of what you can and this is how you present yourself to be unmatchable with your competitors. Companies value individuals who can work well with others, possess good communication and leadership skills, and can deliver results. Prioritizing these skills is key to success.

Q) The concept of love is often misunderstood and misrepresented. In your wisdom, what does love truly

signify? Love is the way you look at the moon upwards. Love is the way you look at the sky. Love is being with that; that makes you tilt your head like you're looking at something, at someone far bigger and higher than yourself, and you know when your head is thrown back, that's when your head has bowed down because now you are looking at someone higher than yourself, and that's what bowing down is. Do you see this? You're standing in front of the mighty Himalayas, and how do you look at them, head hanging? No. Head tilted upwards? Love is the upward glance, and if the thing you are looking at is bigger than you, then it will make you forget all your desires. So, love and desire cannot go together. The moon or the mountain should be able to make you forget yourself, so love is that which makes you forget yourself. You're looking at the moon, and you are gone, and if you are gone, where are your desires? The two are gone. Are they not? Now, where is the future? The future has been dismissed because I do not exist; that's what love must do to you. It must make you disappear; love is not something you can nibble at, enjoy the taste of, and swallow. No, that is not something you can consume; that is not something that tastes delicious. Love is something that does not let you remain; if it's not making you forget yourself, it's not love. How can you remember a particular day as the day of love when you forget all days and all nights? Love is when you forget that even you exist; if you don't, then there is not even a birthday, let alone a Valentine's Day. Is all this sounding too surreal? How do I help it? You go to the other because the other appears attractive, and the other appears attractive because you already have a hunger for stuff—the stuff that you want, you see there in the other. So, you go to the other to consume stuff. If the stuff has been consumed, then the other is of no use; if the other is unable to provide stuff for your consumption even then the other is of no use. So, how can there be any life in the relationship? You just want to sink your teeth into the other, and that's also what the other wants, so two people biting at each other, yeah, has to be very violent. We do not know what is love. Life is an opportunity to know love. In the name of love, all we have is gland secretions, hormones, genital procreation, and the insatiable hunt for experience. All that, obviously, has to come to a dirty end. The fellow did not learn love in 80 years of his life, and you think love can be a thing of one special day. Not possible. What is the boy coming to you for? What is the girl looking at the boy for? Is it all not so obvious? C'mon, yes, and these two are not to be ridiculed; they are to be pied because not only will they not get what they're looking for, they are also laying the groundwork for a lot of suffering. Don't you see that the moment you wish someone a longlasting relationship? What have you said about the nature of their relationship? They're going to be bound to each other for a long time; it's just that what I'm saying will sound very scary because we are people of fear; we just do not know what it means to live in freedom, and we suffer from a terrible feeling of inferiority. They are quite confident that if they do not latch to the other, the other will be gone, and therefore the relationship has to be made long-lasting. The moment you try to put a future into a relationship, the relationship is already dead. So, what does that mean? Great relationships don't have a future? No, great relationships don't care for a future, and these are two different things: great relationships do not formalize a future; great relationships are not ideas in the mind; they are not pre-planned; things happen, and things happen in ways that you cannot even think of ways

beyond. The mind that we have is not of desire but of destiny, but here you are 6 months into the relationship and you start yelling, Oh, let's think of our future; uh, what about us? Let's talk of a relationship, and all that is very normal and very sad. It does not have to be this way; a young person is a fresh possibility; it does not have to be nipped in the bud, but that's how even the greatest opportunities are lost.

Q) My mind is in a constant state of chatter, and I find it impossible to quiet it. Sir, could you please guide me on how

to silence this incessant mental noise?

The mind chatters only about little and inconsequential things. First of all, the matter would be a petty one; secondly, irrespective of how long the chatter is, the matter can never be brought to an end, so it is inconsequential. The mind loves to engage itself with itself; the mind loves to roll in its own stuff; it wants to be a prisoner unto itself, so the mind is doing this; just see that one; it's a petty thing. Second, it does not matter how long you want to think over it, brood over it, cry over it, or whatever worry over it; it will never come to an end; there is no end. So, what to do? Then, just recall that life is bigger and you have more important stuff to do. The mind has to be busy with something. You did not give it something important to be busy with, so it started playing with itself; that's what has happened. The mind is a monkey; it needs something to play with. You gave it nothing; it started playing with its own body. Now, it has its tail in its mouth, is happy that it has a toy to play with, and is crying because the game is painful—that's how the mind behaves. Give the monkey something decent to play with. Is your life settled? Have you reached your end? Have you realized your purpose? Are you at the end of your journey? The mind is the nstrument that helps you along the way. If the car has not yet reached its destination, why is it revving so much on neutral? The mind talking to itself is like a car accelerating on neutral; what does that do? That takes the car nowhere, only heats up the engine and burns the fuel, and that's how most of us burn down our precious life energy. Right, the car is standing on neutral, and the RPM is 6000. Lot of noise and lot of heat and no distance covered, it just appears something is happening; nothing really happens, but the car is built to travel, so this changes the gears and gives it a destination, and all the internal chatter will just stop in neutral even at 6000 RPM; it was going nowhere. Pull the right gear and drive it wisely, and even at 2000 RPM, it will take you places. The mind will not be overworked and will still deliver useful results, but when you are talking to yourself, "Atma sambad," or internal Chit Chat, that continuous conversation with the mirror, let's just dissipate life energy; that's the worst way to exist, to live in your mind. What's the most dangerous place to live in the mind? Horrible is the condition of those who live in their minds, and the only way to get out of your mind is by giving the mind a purpose; nothing else will work. That's a law; all laws apply to nature, right? Just as you have Newton's laws and other laws, similarly, this is the law of the mind, the law of nature. If you don't want the mind to go bonkers playing with itself, then give it a task and don't let the mind ever run out of tasks. Just energy. If you do not give it a purpose solemn enough, the energy will become destructive. Just keep the mind constructively involved with some proper and purposeful, and that will require honesty. We are lazy people, right? When the mind is to be given a proper purpose, the mind will work, but the limbs too will have to work. The mind cannot just work on its own without hands, then eyes, nose, and legs are working, and we don't want that to happen, so we slouch on the couch doing nothing, and only the mind is working. Give the mind a proper purpose; let the entire body, your entire system, and everything in your existence be focused and channeled towards the right purpose in life.

Q) In your view, what is the most effective way for India to

nurture and empower its daughters?

It's quite interesting. You know, garments even for four-year-old girls are more expensive than those for 4-year-old boys. It's as if both the parents and the girls are being messaged that the girl's worth lies in her body and the girls are being her garments; otherwise, physically, a four-year-old girl and a boy are much the same—I mean almost the same. How can there be a difference so much difference in their garments and in their pricing, and I also fail to understand how it is that of course the bodies are different but not so different we simply blow up the differences; it will never be intelligible to me. Why must girls have such long hair? I understand there are differences in height and in build, and after puberty the differences get amplified also. All that is all right, biological,

but why must those differences be exaggerated so much, and you are training her to be body-centric? Do you see that what is lip color? What are all those things that are genderspecific? How exactly do they translate into beauty? These are very fundamental questions; questions mankind should ask. At least parents, they must ask themselves these questions. Why a responsible mother must ever introduce lip gloss to her daughter? Is that not very violent of her to introduce the daughter to lip gloss or to or to costumes that are very feminine? The girl hardly requires them, right? I'm not talking about suppression of sexuality, right? Let sexuality be a celebrated thing in life, and all that is okay. I'm talking of turning someone body-centered at a very young age when she does not even know what she's going through. As a mature adult, you are free to discover your sexuality, experiment with it, enjoy it, celebrate, and do whatever you want to. All that should be done with wisdom when you are mature, but when you are a girl, and your question is how India should raise its daughters, when you are in that phase when you are being raised, a very responsible person should be helming all this. Unfortunately, most parents are themselves in need of self-knowledge and education. So, the way they treat their kids, especially their daughters, is horrible. So, the way boys and girls are differentially introduced to sports and all the little cues that girls keep getting little but continuous, their very seats at the dining table who's supposed to help with the dishes and who's supposed to go outdoors to play, who's supposed to have the guns and who will have the dolls, who can walk around topless even at the age of seven or eight, right seven or eight, the bodies are not so different, but even if the girl is 7 years of age and she's on a beach, the mother will probably ask her to not go topless, and that's not about strangers prying on her. Even if there is nobody on the beach, the mother will say, "Oh, you please cover up." All that turns the girl very body-centric, and that plays havoc with consciousness.

A caricature, she turns out to have no appetite for anything. The body becomes a Troy, the body becomes a weapon, and the mind becomes numb. The result of all this is stupidity, and then you have the caricature of the dumb blonde, right?

Q) Does your companion inspire you to delve into books and cultivate a habit of reading?

You must ask what he brings for me—roses or books. If someone has a stake in making you better, that person will push you towards books; books are what we all need.

Q) How can one stop taking things personally? Often, unfinished tasks or imperfections impact our mood significantly. Similarly, people who shouldn't matter end up influencing us deeply, affecting our emotions and decisions in ways that are far from beneficial. What advice would you offer to help someone stop internalizing these external factors?

When you say you take things personally, you are the person who experiences all those things, right? Yes. So, the first problem is not that you take all the things that happen to the person seriously. A lot of things happen to those people, right? There is a person, and stuff is happening to the person. Someone comes and says, Oh, you deceived me. Someone comes and says, Oh, you are simply incompetent, and the person takes these things seriously, and then the person says, Oh, it's a problem that I take things seriously. Why do you take seriously the person that you are? Why do you believe in your person-hood so much? It does not need to be so abstract. So, we'll simplify it. What do we mean by the person? When you say person, you mean yourself? Right, you have a certain age, certain knowledge, and you come from a certain background. Somebody asks you where you did your boards from; you'll talk of a school; you'll talk of a city; you'll mention the name of your parents; you identify with the gender; and you aspire and dream; this is all that constitutes a person, right? That's what makes a person, so there is the face that represents the body, and then the face has eyes, and the eyes have dreams, right, and then there is the mind, and the mind has thoughts, ideologies, memories, experiences, all these things, right? That's who the person is. That's who the person is. Now why does this person need to be taken seriously? Where does this person come from? Did you choose your gender? Did you choose your religion? Think of all the things that have happened to you, and you will find 99 of them are simply accidental, right? Even if something is accidental, it says I did that. For example, you must have cleared a certain entrance exam to be in the college you are in. Right, yes, no, a lot of that comes from your gray matter,

your brain stuff, right? IQ is important if you are to clear an entrance exam. Of course other things too are important, but without your grey matter, you'll find it very difficult to clear an entrance. Right, that grey matter is largely biological; if one does not choose it, one can at most exercise it, and we know of precocious talents; we know of Wonder babies; we know of kids who, at the age of six, are solving problems that you encounter in class 8th or 10th; you have read of them right. That is just natural, and what is natural is accidental, so how can the person be taken so seriously? The wind blows this way, and the wind blows that way. What's so important or significant in all that it's just a random occurrence, right? The person is largely a random thing; it says that the ego does not want to encounter the fact of randomness, so even to random events and a random collection of experiences and influences like the person, it starts claiming an agency or it starts ascribing an agency. Would you understand agency as if there is a central entity but there is no central entity? The central entity itself is a myth, and the entire aim of wisdom is to get rid of this fictitious central entity claiming to be real. What is this fictitious? The central entity is called the ego, the self. Okay, right, and it's the self, the eye, that's at the center of the person right now. Someone comes and says, Oh, you are ugly. The thing is, you did not even choose to be pretty. How can you choose to be ugly? Nobody chooses her color; nobody chooses her height. Even the things where we think we have exercised a choice, the choice is a greatly an influenced choice. Is it not? So think of the way people, for example, choose their college, their jobs, or their partners. These are not free choices, huh? Though we say I chose, we never really choose things; they just happen. Water falls over sodium; does sodium choose to react? The explosion just happens, huh, and sodium is more honest than human beings in the sense that sodium does not have an agency that claims I did that, but when it comes to human beings, we all have a central fictitious agency that says I did that, whereas events happen just in the way water happens to sodium; that's the way our life events take place, so why to take the person so seriously? If you have a certain ideology, probably you got it from your house or neighborhood or school or media; it's not yours, so somebody comes and casts aspersions at your ideology. That's fine; that's not your ideology. Your religion, nobody chooses her religion, and even when people say they are choosing their religion, even that choice is an influence choice, so no choice at all. Nobody really chooses a partner; people just fall in love, and that's also chemical and biological, just so predictable. So, the person itself is a bit of a joke. There is no person, and if there is no person, how can you take things personally? Let Bobs be thrown at you. If you do not exist, how will they hurt you? They'll not hurt you. Something hurts you only when you exist. so, so when you see that your person-hood is a myth you become the heir, you become the open sky, then you cannot be hurt you're not hurting me, I'm not who you are, who you who you think I am, you're throwing something at me it passes through me, I can be hurt only when first of all I am the person you think I am. When one stops taking themself seriously it becomes very difficult for the world to hurt them. The one who is able to hurt you will also be able to control you and you do not want to be controlled, right? So if you allow the world to mean too much to you the world will simply overpower you, possess you, enslave you, you do not want that right? See, it's such a remarkable and unfortunate thing that those who allow the world to mean too much to them, those who become ultra-sensitive to hurt and praise, and such things, are the ones who become victims of the world. Anyone can come and possess you through praise, and anyone can come and possess you through infamy and calumny. Someone comes and says, "Oh, you are great", and he has had you, and someone comes and says, "Oh, you are obnoxious", and this one too has had you. You don't want that to happen, right? Yes, so it's okay. You think that I am ugly, fine. Here's a joke on ugliness. Learn to take yourself with more than a pinch of salt. You are not important, nobody is ever important. The two of us who are talking to each other—I mean, you know what the fate of these two talking entities is. Look at all the dirt by the wayside. When you are gone, you will be just the dirt by the wayside, so am I right? Look at the sand. Look at the filth. There's dust on the table. Right, you know what that dust is. That dust was a person one day. How do I take the person seriously?

Hosted at the Bharat Mandapam International Exhibition-Convention Centre in New Delhi, the summit was a landmark event, addressing critical global issues and fostering transformative change through international collaboration and innovative solutions. From September 9-10, leaders from the world's largest economies gathered, providing a platform for robust discussions and setting the stage for innovative solutions to the world's most pressing challenges with profound implications, shaping policies that promote sustainability and equity on a global scale. 

The most common rebuilding was probably the drivetrain with components and ensuring that the power was sent to all four wheels to improve the car's traction, handling, and general performance. In order to comply with strict competition rules and reengineering complete of the chassis, suspension system, and steering mechanism. It required unprecedented precision and extensive testing integrate sophisticated components, including transfer cases, differentials, and extra drive shafts.

competition was preceded by months of conditioning. rigorous preparation event's commenced with the registration of team members and the faculty advisor for SAEINDIA membership. Upon completing process, they were issued unique IDs, making them eligible to participate in the competition. The team made a significant choice to switch to a four-wheel-drive system after carefully examining Furthermore, tuning the vehicle for the added weight complexity without giving away an inch in agility and speed was quite a task. For example, the dynamics of suspension and control systems had to be adjusted continuously in order ensure optimized traction and stability across a broad range of difficult surfaces. It is an innovative mindset that truly makes a difference in such obstacles. Towards this end, state-of-the-art CAD

modeling and simulation tools were next used for further refinements in design, and optimization was done before fabrication to ensure perfect compatibility and functionality. The cautious utilization of flexible materials and fabrication innovation helped to overcome the weight issue while also improving the vehicle's basic stability.

The project involved extensive collaboration and knowledge sharing among team members to address unexpected technical issues. This collaborative effort not only strengthened the team's bond but also enhanced their collective problemsolving capabilities, resulting in a more resilient and well-integrated 4-wheel drive system.

To efficiently integrate the new four-wheel drive system with the current vehicle design, mechanical, electrical, and software specialists worked together during the implementation phase. Through rigorous testing in controlled and real-world situations, it validated critical performance parameters as acceleration, torque distribution, and cornering ability. At the SAE BAJA competition, the newly modified 4WD vehicle triumphed in a variety of trials, including mindnumbing hill climbs, treacherous mud pits, and intricate rock crawling. The vehicle's improved traction and stability were instantly noticeable, earning praise from examiners and plaudits from fellow participants. The team's invincible focus and technical refinement were reflected in their notable achievements, which finishing 91st in the preliminary round and second in Uttar Pradesh. Their immaculate success in the All-Wheel Drive test, where they got a perfect 60 out of 60, fueled their desire for continued innovation.

The ambitious conversion of their vehicle from a 2-wheel drive to a 4-wheel drive system demonstrated not just their technical abilities but also their capacity to overcome complicated challenges and push the limits of performance. महामना पं० मालवीय एवं धर्मसूबाट करपात्री जी के मध्य शास्त्रार्थ

भारत राष्ट्र की हो महान विभूतियों, महामना पंडित महन मोहन मालवीय एवं धर्मसमाट करपात्री जी महाराज के बीच हुए एक शास्त्रार्थ जिसके केंद्र में थी सनातन परंपराएं जिनमें हेश, काल व परिस्थिति अनुसार संशोधिन किया जा सकता है या शास्त्रों को शाश्वत प्रमाण मानते हुए उनका निर्वाहन मूल स्वक्रप में किया जाना चाहिए।

पॅ० मदन मोहन मालवीय का जन्म २५ दिसंबर १८६१ को प्रयागगज में पिता पं० बुजनाथ चतुर्वेदी और माता मूना देवी के निवास में हुआ था। उन्होंने ही बनारस हिँन्दू विश्वविद्यालय और हिन्दू महासभा की क्थापना केरी थी। वह एक कुशल वकील, एक कर्मठ अध्यापक व एक कूशाय संपाढ्क थे। वह ऑरतीय राष्ट्रीय कांग्रेस के चार बार ही अध्यक्ष थे, उन्होंने मण्डकोपनिषद मंत्र "सत्यमेव जयते' को लोकप्रिय किया था और गांधी जी ने उन्हें "महामना" की उपाधि से सुशोभित किया थी, जिसका ॲभिप्राय उच्च व बडे मन वाला होता है। उन्हें २०१५ में मरणोपराँत भारत रत्न से भी सुशोभित किया गया।

करपात्री जी महाराज का जन्म ११ अगस्त १९०७ को भटनी, प्रलापगढ़ में एक सरयूपारीण बाह्मण परिवार में पिता रामनिधि ओझा व माता शिवरानी देवी के निवास में हुआ था। उनका मूल नाम हरि वारायण ओझा थी। उन्होंने १९ वर्ष की आयु में संन्यास लिया ओर उनका नाम पडा होरहरानंद सरस्वती. <u>उन्हें</u> क्रिपात्री भी कहा जाता था, जिसका अर्थ होता है, जिनके हाथ ही उनके बर्तन हाँ, उन्हें उनकी अतुलनीय बुद्धि एवं शास्त्रीय ज्ञान के कारण धर्मसम्राट भी कहा जाता था। उन्होंने आध्निक भारत में धर्म को बचाने कें लिए कई आँढोलन करे जैसे गौरक्षा आँढोलन, हिंढ कोड बिल का विरोध, इत्यादि। 3888 में अखिल उन्होंने भारतीय राम राज्य परिषद्ध की स्थापना करी जिसके १९५२ के आम चनाव में ३ माँसद निर्वाचितं हए।

मूलतः महामना सनातन धर्मी र्वेता थे प्रन्तु वह समुद्ध पार की यात्रा और स्तियों व शुद्धों को प्रणव मंत्र युक्त दीक्षा देने को देश, काल एवं परिस्थिति अनुसार सही मानते थे व शास्त्र सम्मत भी बताते थे। उन्होंने इस विषय पर शास्त्रार्थ की घोषणा तक कर ढी थी। १९३२ में हरिद्वार के कुम्भ मेले के अवसर में वह ऋषिकेश में थे और वहाँ शास्त्रार्थ के लिए विशिष्ट मैच का निर्माण किया गया था. वहाँ से महामना अपने पक्ष में तर्क व शास्त्रीय प्रमाण पेश कर रहे थे तभी मंच् से कुछ द्रशी पर एक वृक्ष के नीचे खंडे हाँकर एक नवयुवक मालवीय जी के तर्कों का खण्डन करने लगा, वह नवयुवक करपात्री जी थें, फिर महामना ने स्वयं

वक्ष के नीचे आकर करपात्री जी से मैच पर चलने का आबूह किया एवं करपात्री जी ने भी तत्क्षण शास्त्रार्थ की प्रतिस्पर्धा क्विकार करी। अब महामना और क्रपात्री जी के मध्य शास्त्रार्थ होना था व मध्यस्त थे हो विद्वान, पहले थे गीता प्रेस, गोरखपुर के संस्थापक सेठ श्री जयदयॉल गोयन्दका जी व दूसरे थे अच्युत ग्रंथमाला, लेलिताघाट काशी के संस्थापक सेठ श्री गौरीशंकर गोयन्दका जी, और केंद्र में थी सनातन पर्वपराएँ। केरपात्री जी को शास्त्रीय सिद्धांतों पर कोई समझोता स्विकार न था, उनके लिए शास्त्र ही शाश्वत प्रमाण था, उनका कहना था कि, जो देश, काल व परिस्थिति के अंजुंसार तोंड़-मरोड़ लिया जाए वो शास्त्र कैसा? फिर तो वो बस एक बहमत प्राप्त प्रपत्र से अधिक कुछै भी नहीं। गंभीर तर्क-वितर्के हुआ, मध्यस्त कुछ हिचक रहे थैं। अतः ७१ वर्षीय महामना जी पराजय स्वीकार कर २५ वर्षीय करपात्री जी के जान के समक्ष नतमस्तक हए।

हसी परंपरा को आगे बढ़ाते हुए काशी के केढ़ारघाट में वेढशास्त्रागुसंधान केंढ़ करपात्री जो के कर कमलों से सुशोभित हुआ और नाम रखा गया करपात्री धाम। महामना जी ने पराजय स्वीकार कर सनातन परंपरा के शाश्वत तत्व को जाना जिसका आधार वेढ एवं शास्त्र हैं, जो कि किसी भी ढेश, काल व परिस्थिति में अपरिवर्तनीय रहती हैं।

"धरती माँ" इस शब्द में ही कितनी करुणा, प्रेम और ममता छिपी हुई है, आज हम इसी माँ के हृदय में खंजर घोप रहे हैं। अपनी सृख-सृविधा एवं आरामदायक जीवन की खोज में हम भूल गय हैं कि किसी भी वस्तु का नहीं अतिढोहन अच्छा तकनीक सम्पन्न एव विकसित बनने की होड़ में यह भूलते जा रहे हैं कि प्रकृति ह्वारा प्रद्वोंन किये गये समस्तं स्त्रोत सीमित हैं। हम अपने स्वार्थ के लिए क्या कूछ नहीं रहे हैं, आज हमे प्रकृति की कराह सुनाई नहीं दे रहीं है, प्रकृति विभिन्न माध्यमों से हमे चेतावनी दे रही है, जैसे कि बेंगलूक में पानी की कमी, बाड़मैंर में अचानक से 200 फीट का गडुढा हो जाना, पहाड़ी क्षेत्रों में भूस्खलन एवं विभिन्न क्षेत्रों में बाढे एवं तूफान का आना। इन सब घटनाँओं के बाद भी हम क्षण भर भी रुकने को तैयार नहीं है, लेकिन अगर हम आज न्हीं रुके तो प्रकृति हमें मजबूरन रोकेगी।

हमारे घरों से निकला हुआ कचुरा पहाड़ का आकार ले रहा है, और उसके आस-पास रहने वाले वन्य जीने के लिए घातक साबित हो रहा है। वास्तविकता तो यह है कि राजनीतिक स्तर पर भी उचित कार्यवाही नहीं हो रही है। आपने प्रो. जी. डी. अग्रवाल का नाम सुना ही होगा, शायह नहीं क्योंकि हमारी मीडिया ऐसे मुह्रों पर ज्यादा ध्यान नहीं देती है, प्रो० जी. डी. अग्रवाल आई.आई.टी. कानपुर में प्रोफेसर एवं केन्द्रीय प्रदेषण नियंत्रण बोर्ड के पहले संचिव सदस्य थे। गंगा के संरक्षण के लिए कानून बनाने

की गाँग को लेकर उन्होंने 22 जन २०१८ को आमरण अनशन शुंक किया और 112 दिनों के उपवास के बाढ़ हृदय गति रुकने से उनकी मृत्यू हो गई। अनश्न शरू करनें से पहले उन्होंने तात्कालीन प्रधानमंत्री को कई पत्र लिखे परन्तु कोई जवाब नहीं मिला। इसके अलावा 2011 में युवा तपस्वी स्वामी निगमानन्द की गंगा में अवैध खनन के खिलाफ हरिद्वार में अनशन के 115वें दिन मृत्यू हो गई। 1998 में क्वामी निगमानँढ के साथ अवैध खनन के खिलाफ पहला अनशन करने वाले स्वामी गोकलानंद की 2003 में खनन माफिया ने नेनीताल में हत्या कर दी। नैना को बचाने के प्रयास में बाबा नागनाथ की वाराणसी में अनशन के 114वें दिन मृत्यू हो गई, ऐसे सैकड़ों लोग है जिन्होंने प्रकृति को बचाने के लिए अपने प्राणों की आहति दे दी।

विश्व की लगभग 17 प्रतिशत आबाढी वहन करने वाला भारत विश्व के ताजे जल सँसाधनों का मात्र 4 प्रतिशत् ही रखता है, जो यह स्पष्ट रूप से दिखाता है कि यिं जल का विवेकपूर्ण तरीके से उपयोग नहीं किया गया तो हमें भीषण अकाल का सामना करना पड़ सकता है। नीति आयोग के समग्र जल प्रबंधन यचकाँक के अनसार देश में 600 मिलियन से अधिक लोग जल की गंभीर कमी का सामना कर रहे हैं और यह आकलन किया गया है कि वर्ष 2030 तक ढेश की जल माँग उपलब्ध आपूर्ति की तुलना में ढोगूनी हो जाऍगी।

भारत की लगभग शत् प्रतिशत आबाढ़ी वाय प्रढ्षण से प्रभावित है। लेसेंट पॅत्रिका द्वारा गठित लेसेन्ट कमीशन के एक अध्ययन के अनुसार प्रदूषण के कारण विश्व में 2019 मैं 90 लाख और भारत में 23 लाख से अधिक लोगों की असामयिक मृत्यू हुई है। दशकों पहले लोगीं की सविधा के लिए प्लास्टिक का ऑविष्कार किया गया लेकिन धीरे- धीरे यह अब प्रयावरण के लिए नासर बन गया प्लास्टिक और पॉलिथीन के कारण पृथ्वी और जल के साथ साथ वायू भी प्रद्वित होती जा रही है। आज के समय में जहाँ ढेखो प्लास्टिक एवं इससे निर्मित पढार्थों का ढेर देखने को मिल जाता है। पहले तो यह ढेर धरती तक ही सीमित था लेकिन अब यह निदयों से लेकर समृद्ध तक हर जगह नजर आने लॅगा है। एक मिनट में दनिया में लाखों प्लास्टिक की बाँतलें खरीढ़ी जा रही हैं, पर्यटन क्षेत्रों को लगातार पर्यटकों ह्वारा गँढा किया जा रहा है, यही प्रदूषण विभिन्न घातक बीमारियों की कारण बन रहा है जो कि प्रतिव्यक्ति जीवन प्रत्याशा को कम कर रहा है।

पर्यावरण को संरक्षित करना सिर्फ सरकार या किसी एक समुद्धाय का काम नहीं है, अपितु प्रत्येक व्यक्ति को प्रयास करना होगा। प्राकृतिक संसाधनों का दोहन अपने चरम स्तर पर पहुँच चुका है, यदि हम आज नहीं जाने तो भविष्य में प्रकृति अपने अनुसार स्वयं को संरक्षित करेनी जो कि पूरी मानव जाति के लिए भयावह होगा।

निहर है, यह कथन उनकी बहादुरी और समर्पण को दशीता है।
3.अनियमित रोजगारः मजदूरों को अवसर अस्थायी या मौसमी रोजगार मिलता है, जिससे उनकी आर्थिक स्थित स्थिर नहीं रहती।
4. सामाजिक सुरक्षा का अभावः मजदूरों को सामाजिक सुरक्षा का अभावः मजदूरों को सामाजिक सुरक्षा योजनाओं का लाभ नहीं मिलता, जैसे स्वास्थ्य बीमा, पेंशन आढि।

4. श्रमिक शिक्षा और प्रशिक्षणः मजढूरों को शिक्षा और प्रशिक्षण के अवसर प्रदान किए जाने चाहिए, ताकि वे अपने कौशल को बढ़ा सकें।

जलवायु परिवर्तन : एक वैश्विक चुनौती

जलवाय परिवर्तन आज के समय में एक ऐसी वास्तविकता है जिसका सामना पूरी दनिया कर रही है। यह एक ऐंसी समस्या है जो मानव जाति के अस्तित्व को ही खतरे में डाल रही है। जलवाय परिवर्तन का मतलब वातावरण में तापमान, वर्षा, हवाओं की गति और अन्य सँबंधी घटकों मोसम में दीर्घकालिक परिवर्तन। यह परिवर्तन प्राकृतिक कारणों के साथ-साथ ंमानव निर्मित कारणों से भी होता है।

प्राकतिक कारणों में सूर्य की ऊर्जी में परिवर्तन, ज्वालामखी विक्फोट, महासागरीय धाराँओं में परिवर्तन आढि शामिल हैं। इन कारणों का प्रभाव धीरे-धीरे और लँबे समय में होता है। लेकिन मानव निर्मित कारणों का प्रभाव अधिक तीव्र और तत्काल होता है। इनमें जीवाश्म ईंधन का अत्यधिक उपयोग, की कटाई. वर्ना औद्योगिकीकरण, वाहनों का बढ़ता प्रयोग आढ़ि शामिल हैं। इन कारणों से ग्रीनहाउस गैसों का उत्सर्जन बढ़ता है जो वातावरण में गर्मी को फैसाकर ग्लोबल वार्किंग का कारण बनता है।

जलवायु परिवर्तन के प्रभाव विविध हैं और इसका असर सभी जीवों पर पड़ता है। इससे समुद्र का स्तर बढ़ता है, जिससे तटीय क्षेत्रों में बाढ़ आने का खतरा बढ़ जाता है। अत्यधिक गर्मी और सूखे की स्थितियाँ भी बढ़ रही हैं, जिससे कृषि उत्पाढन पर नकारात्मक प्रभाव पड़ता है। जलवायु परिवर्तन से जीवों के प्रवासन पैटर्न में भी बढ़लाव आता है, जिससे जैव विविधता पर भी असर पडता है। इस समस्या का समाधान खोजने के लिए विश्व स्तर पर कई प्रयास किए जा रहे हैं। पेरिस समझौता जैसे अंतरर्राष्ट्रीय समझौते इस दिशा में एक महत्वपूर्ण कदम हैं। इसके अलावा, नवीकरणीय ऊर्जा के स्रोतों का विकास, ऊर्जा की बचत, वनीकरण, और सतत विकास के लिए प्रयास भी इस समस्या के समाधान में सहायक हो सकते हैं।

हमें यह समझना होगा कि जलवायू परिवर्तन केवल एक ढेश या क्षेत्र की समस्या नहीं हे, बल्कि यह एक वैश्विक समस्या है जिसका समाधान भी वैश्विक क्तर पर ही होना चाहिए। हम सभी को मिलकर इस समस्या का सामना करना होगा और इसके लिए ठोस कढ्म उठाने होंगे। यह हमारी और हमारी आने वाली पीढ़ियों की भविष्य की खातिर अत्यंत आवश्यक है। जलवायु परिवर्तन पर और विस्तार से चर्चा करते हुए, हमें इसके वैश्विक प्रभावों पर भी गौर करना चाहिए। इसके अनेक प्रभावों में से कुछ महत्वपूर्ण प्रभाव निम्नलिखित हैं:



आर्थिक प्रभावः जलवायु परिवर्तन से आर्थिक विकास पर भी असर पड़ता है। अत्यधिक मौसमी घटनाओं के कारण आर्थिक नुकसान, बीमा ढावों में वृद्धि, और खाद्य उत्पादन में कमी जैसे कारक आर्थिक स्थिरता को

प्रभावित करते हैं। इन सभी प्रभावों को देखते हुए, जलवाय परिवर्तन के खिलाँफी लडाई में सभी ढेशों का सहयोग अत्यंत आवश्यक है। इसके लिए न केवल सरकारी नीतियों में बढ्लाव की जरूरत है, बल्कि प्रत्येक व्यक्ति को भी अपने जीवनशैली में सुधार लाना होगा। ऊर्जा की बचत, जल सॅरक्षण, और पर्यावरण के अनुकूल उत्पादों का उपयोग कर्वों इस दिशा में छोटे लेकिन महत्वपर्ण कढ्म हो सकते हैं। जलवायु परिवर्तन को रोकने के लिए हमें अपने जीवनशैली में बढ्लाव लाने होंगे। जलवायू

परिवर्तन के खिलाफ लड़ाई में हम सभी की भागीदारी अत्यंत महत्वपूर्ण है। हमें अधिक से अधिक पेड़ लगाने होंगे, ऊर्जा की बचत करनी होगी, और पर्यावरण के अनुकूल उत्पादों का उपयोग करना होगा। यदि हम आज इस दिशा में कद्म उठाते हैं, तो हम एक स्वस्थ और हरित भविष्य का निर्माण कर सकते हैं।



n a momentous and epochal event that has captivated the hearts of ■ millions, the grand consecration ceremony of the Ram Mandir in Ayodhya stands as a historic milestone for India. Celebrated with great fervor and passion, this much-awaited event ushers in a new era for the ancient city of Ayodhya and represents a crucial chapter in the nation's spiritual and cultural tapestry. The nearly 70-year-old conflict came to an end on November 9, 2019, as the fivejudge bench ordered the setting up of a trust that paved the way for the construction of a temple at Ayodhya. "January 22, 2024: Not just a date, It is the Beginning Of A New Era." A glorious moment of spiritual and cultural renewal took place during the ceremony. Situated in Ayodhya, the temple was dedicated to Lord Ram, a revered figure in Hindu mythology and a symbol of valor and righteousness. It stood as an architectural marvel, a perfect fusion of modern grace and ancient Indian temple design. Expansive courtyards, elaborate pillars, and fine carvings all contributed to its grandeur and showcased the rich artistic spiritual legacy of ancient India. The temple was built to hold thousands of worshippers and was a symbol of

devotion and national pride.

In honor of the "Pran Pratishtha" ritual, the sacred city was decked out in vivid flowers. The ritual or ceremony called Pran Pratishtha is used in Hindu temples to sanctify murtis or devotional images of deities. In this ritual, the deity is invited to be a resident guest by reciting hymns and mantras, and the opening of the murti's eye for the first time signifies the deity's presence. A laser show was also staged in 'Ram ki Paidi' Saryu ghat on the eve of the consecration ceremony.

This event was more than merely the inauguration of a place of devotion; it was the fulfillment of decades of desires and a significant spiritual and cultural turning point. For many, it represented the realization of a cherished dream and the revival of a sacred cultural and religious landmark. It was anticipated that the temple's presence in Ayodhya would draw a large number of pilgrims visitors, strengthening and city's economic growth and cultural revival. For Ayodhya, the effect of this event was profound. The temple, an iconic pilgrimage site, was expected to boost regional trade, tourism, and the development of infrastructure. The city's economy was predicted to flourish, and its standing as a major hub for culture and spirituality was raised by the anticipated flood of tourists.

Furthermore, the temple anticipated to play a pivotal role in advancing social and community initiatives. In keeping with temple's purpose to promote social welfare and spiritual development, planned activities included philanthropic work, educational initiatives, and support for regional development projects. This was not solely the unveiling of a new religious structure; it was also the beginning of a new chapter in the cultural and spiritual narrative of India. The Ram Mandir emerged as a symbol of tenacity, faith, and harmony Ayodhya commemorated momentous occasion, inspiring the following generation and solidifying its place in India's great heritage. As a tribute to the enduring strength of devotion and the unifying spirit of a nation, the temple stands as a beacon of hope and perseverance.
